DPT Students Win Support as Political Advocates for their Profession

Last February, Congressman Steve Chabot accepted an invitation to come to campus and hear about our students' concerns. This visit preceded a letter writing campaign initiated by former Vice President of the Student Physical Therapy Association, Nick Salcedo and several of his classmates in the Class of 2013 on behalf of House Resolution 1426 and Senate Bill 975.

Congressman Chabot learned firsthand from a panel of Mount DPT students who gave candid testimony of the impact of student loan indebtedness on their daily lives and how opening the door to physical therapists to participate in National Health Service Corps (NHSC) is beneficial to both physical therapy students and to the populations that the NHSC serves.

Congressman Chabot was certainly impressed and influenced by the efforts of our students. In March, Chabot joined the ranks of the now 121 co-sponsors of the legislation in the U.S. House of Representatives. This was a striking example of how Mount DPT students have embraced advocacy as part of their professional responsibility to shape and influence legislation that affects their profession.

PT Electives Provide DPT Students with Unique Learning Opportunities

During the initial planning of the DPT curriculum, the PT faculty knew they wanted to generate opportunities within our program that would offer students the chance to grow and develop their knowledge beyond the required entry level skill set. This strong desire to foster our students' professional growth

in clinical practice led to the development of elective courses in the DPT curriculum. Each student enrolled in the College of Mount St. Joseph DPT program is required to take at least three credit hours of elective course work. These three credit hours of electives can be concentrated in a single practice pattern area such as pediatrics, sports or geriatrics, or they can be a sampling of different practice patterns for those students who have not yet narrowed their interest in PT.

Over the past four years, the DPT program has offered elective courses including: Pediatrics (with emphasis on handling skills with pediatric patients with developmental disabilities); Advanced Neuro Rehab; Advanced Manual Therapy for the Orthopedic Patient; Bracing and Taping; Splinting and Hand Therapy; The Throwing Athlete; The Running Athlete; Home Care PT; Lymphedema; Animal Rehab; Equine Therapy; and Clinical Spanish.

Dr. Marsha Eifert-Mangine Ed.D., PT, ATC and Certified Equine Rehabilitation Therapist (CERT) through the Animal Rehabilitation Institute, offers a unique elective in the area of Equine Rehabilitation. This elective is a "hands on" course that compares the fundamental differences of the anatomy,

biomechanics, and gait of the horse compared to the human. Students are introduced to assessment of musculoskeletal conditions of the equine as well as the application of interventions utilized in equine rehabilitation. Students explore the role of the physical therapist in the management of equine clients including interaction with other members of the team (owner, rider, trainer, farrier, veterinarian), and review of the laws, regulations and ethical scenarios related to the evaluation and treatment of animals by a physical therapist.

This past summer three students – Candice Burnam, Jenna Fay and Kristin George took the Equine Rehabilitation elective which has both a lecture and a lab component. While the lecture took place on campus and featured "NCIS Pony" – a full axial skeleton of a hackney pony that Dr. Eifert-Mangine uses for teaching purposes, the lab was held at Little Britain Farm in Burlington, KY. The labs involved interaction with live horses and ponies with Dr. Eifert-Mangine's daughter Angela assisting as the horse handler. The two, seven-hour lab days were long and hot in the June sun, but the group did take the time to enjoy "tea" on the porch of the carriage house.

On April 3, twelve acute care clinical educators from Greater Cincinnati and Dayton hospitals participated in our first Institute for the Advancement of Health Sciences CEU offering in the new Health Sciences Simulation and Skills Lab. Participants had the opportunity to complete a simulation case study and subsequent debriefing using the high fidelity SimMan® 3G technology, as well as the opportunity to practice the One-Minute Clinical Instructor model for assessing and teaching clinical reasoning. The participants found the experience to be very beneficial and this course may be offered again in the near future.

Safe Patient Handling Equipment

Through the generous support of Mercy Health Partners and ArjoHuntleigh, the Nursing and DPT programs at the College of Mount St. Joseph received several pieces of safe patient handling equipment to assist with educating future clinicians with this technology. The gifts include a Sara Steady®, Sara Plus™, and Maxi Move™ with plans for a Maxi Air™ in the future. Students appreciate

the opportunity to train and familiarize themselves with this equipment even before beginning their clinical education.

- Among many other initiatives, the Mount DPT students participated in this year's St Jude Give Thanks Walk in Newport on Saturday, November 17. Students raised over \$1,000 for the children at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.


