RESIDENT SCHEDULE**

This residency is a first year post-graduate pharmacy residency (PGY1) program that intended to provide its graduates with a variety of advanced practice skills including:

- ❖ Functioning effectively as a pharmacist in multiple healthcare environments
- ❖ Functioning effectively as a member of an interdisciplinary primary care team
- ❖ Working under a collaborative practice agreement to provide direct patient care services including disease state management, patient education and wellness promotion
- ❖ Developing leadership skills in all areas of pharmacy practice management including continuous quality improvement, medication use evaluation, drug information, staff development and formulary management
- ❖ Developing and refining teaching, writing, and speaking skills to ensure professionalism in providing patient/staff/student education and information
- ❖ Developing the ability to manage one's own practice
- ❖ Becoming a self-directed learner who takes personal responsibility for attaining excellence in one's ability to provide pharmaceutical care
